


The pattern is by Elizabeth Hartman. It was fun to make and I felt like an engineer after following her really wonderful and precise instructions!

(of cores it's in purple)






Leaders And Enders









6 Front

Their needlework is reverse applique using multiple layers of fabric.

I have a sister who lives in Panama.

I decided to turn these molas into wall hangings with borders of black grunge fabric, and I hand quilted the borders with orange thread.

The indigenous people of Panama often incorporate molas into their clothing.
